

FIRST YEARS OF ALTONA TENNIS CLUB

Harry Blair, father of current ALHS member Roger Blair, was the first president of the newly formed Altona Tennis Club in 1938, using two asphalt courts built alongside the Altona Homestead Museum where the car park and the adjoining Beryl Hevey Centre (Altona Senior Citizens) are now situated.

Hannorah (Norah) Twentyman, Roger's grandmother, leased the homestead where the family lived for many years. Norah was always concerned by the lack of facilities in the town for providing young people with healthy activities and was the driving force behind four of her family and council establishing the new Altona Tennis Club. They had early success with winning their first premiership in 1941.

Playing fixtured matches alongside the homestead was always popular as Norah would provide afternoon tea with scones in the homestead courtyard during a well earned half time interval, before players would head back to the courts to complete their games. Later on Norah was made the first patron of Altona Tennis Club.

Around 1948 a tin army hut was erected near the courts for use as a clubroom. In 1958 it was transferred to Grant Reserve where two entecar courts were to be built by council followed by another four courts later on.

Council replaced the tin army hut in 1975 with the current modern brick building.

The Twentyman's, and Blairs, continued to be active members of the Altona Tennis Club for many years.

The above information was recently provided by Roger Blair as passed on to him by his father, Harry Blair.


