#### SNIPPETS OF INFORMATION


While stuck at home in Victoria's COVID-19 Lockdown No. 6, I revisited researching my own family history and I've had an old family photograph album for some time that once belonged to my great grandparents. I opened it for another look at the few photographs that have names to see if I could make any more sense of them now that I know a lot more about my ancestors. However, I took more notice of a little card in the back that had been issued by Melbourne General Cemetery bearing the brief information that John Jones died on 13 April 1888 aged 55 years and was interred in the cemetery.

I didn't know the name at all, we didn't have any Jones people in our family as far as I was aware and thought perhaps he was a close friend. I looked at the Victorian Births Deaths and Marriages (VIC BDM) website to see if I could find any more information about the gentleman. It didn't take long to locate the entry which showed he was the husband of Catherine Quinn, an exciting find as we do have Quinn family in our tree. Catherine was my 3 x great aunt. After more research in VIC BDM, together with records on ancestry.com.au and other people's family trees, I was able to build up a bare bones picture of Catherine and her descendants for three generations.

I have found a branch of my family tree that I was unaware existed and 26 people who were entitled to be added as we share common ancestors, the parents of Catherine Quinn and my 3 x great grandparents, Mary and John Quinn.

Mary and John lived in Ireland in the mid 1800s raising their four children. Then after John died, Mary packed up her family including Catherine, all nearing adulthood, and migrated to Australia escaping the ravages of the Irish potato famine. They arrived in Geelong in August 1854 before settling in Melbourne. I'm descended from Catherine's sister, Honorah Mary Quinn.

This has been a very enjoyable learning curve discovering how a simple card with only a few facts that seemed to have no connection to my family, turned out to be so different to what I first thought.

Despite the Global shut down and the disruption of the last few months our ALHS committee has continued on with all the important research projects, on-line from their homes, virtually without pause. It has been a privilege and a great pleasure to be part of this very productive, dedicated and creative team.

All Homestead public activities, including our first Sunday of the month Devonshire Teas, (a significant source of income for the society), were also shut down by Covid requirements. The Devonshire Teas are, hopefully, to reopen early 2022.

The success of the Devonshire Teas is very largely due to our Vice President Kim Reilly who works tirelessly to provide, along with Graeme and their team, a highly professional product appreciated by locals who by their return bookings indicate ongoing support to the Altona Homestead and its historical activities.

The Research/Archiving room upgrade has finally become a reality with the space now more accessible as a work area for members to carry out cataloguing, filing and research activities in a less cluttered environment.

For some months now on a Tuesday, when not subject to restrictions, Ann, Jim and Graeme visit Truganina Reserve to carry out archiving, scanning and the recording of the historical files kept on site. Their work aims to integrate Truganina Reserve files and data with the existing ALHS cataloguing system. This large undertaking by our three members is in addition to their other ongoing workload on behalf of the ALHS.

Tuesday's Market Day opening along with school groups were conducted at the Homestead between the last and the second last shut down. A very big thank you to Elaine Tamlyn for her continued (nine years), support to the Society on

Tuesday open days. Russell Grant 's attendance at the Homestead for meetings and open days continues to bring a level of local knowledge and historical awareness that is indispensable to the society.

Our secretary Graeme Reilly completed a three by 1.5 hour sessions to U3A on the History of Altona. The feedback from those who attended was extremely positive and Graeme's excellent presentation brought significant credit to the Altona Laverton Historical Society within the Hobson Bay community.

Ann Cassar, the Altona Laverton Historical Society's archivist, also found extra time to focus on unravelling the mystery of the unidentified Langhorne family remains interred in the Langhorne grave.

This year we commemorate 60 years as a historical society and look forward to celebrating with members at our AGM in December.

#### Family Research may have solved a Mystery?

Our Secretary and Member Graeme Reilly while carrying out some Ancestry research on a local family, raised the question regarding any information the Society may have about **Charles McDonald** a member of the **Altona Football Club** who had later joined and played for South Melbourne in the Victorian Football League in the 1920s.



This information has been confirmed, Charles McDonald born in 1901 played with Altona Football Club, and joined South Melbourne Football Club for five seasons between 1924 and 1928, he later returned to the Altona Football Club becoming a coach of the Under 18 team which were Runners Up in the Werribee League in 1952.



He is recorded as a Life Member of the Altona Football Club.

The enquiries in regard to Charles McDonald and his football history seems to have led us to cross paths with a matter that we raised in our Newsletter Number 37 in 2013.

The ALHS has in its records a photo with a hand written note on it stating "Altona RSL Football Team 1921":our enquiries at that stage had indicated that no persons were aware of the Altona RSL ever having a football team and we requested that anyone with knowledge of such a team to contact the Society.

Subsequent enquiries have indicated that the Altona RSL was not formally in existence in 1921.



Author Carolyn Jackson in her Book,"As You Were"a history of the Altona RSL Sub Branch published in 2006, states on Page 2-"One day in 1921 a dozen local residents gathered in the ABC, across from the windswept beach, and held the clubs first meeting. Early members of this 'club' which was not yet officially part of the (Returned Services) League included (a number of persons therein named) who were the engine that drove the fledgling club to survive.

On page 5 it is stated, that, in 1930 the young club reached its first milestone when, on the 21st June, it received its Charter from Anzac House. It was now officially "established and constituted" as part of the Returned Sailors and Soldiers Imperial

League of Australia.

This would indicate that perhaps we have misinterpreted the hand written message on the image passed on to the Society in that the meaning is that it was a photo, possibly donated by a member of the Altona RSL, which was actually one of the 1921 Altona Football Club team.

On the following two pages we show a series of images that appear to indicate that **Charles McDonald** may in fact be **in the original team photo of 1919** (6) denoted as unidentified player (1) and also the **1921 team photo** (7),denoted as unidentified player (2), prior to his moving on to South Melbourne.

His image is shown on a cigarette card from the 1920s era (3) for comparison purposes.

His description by those who knew him was that he was tall, with red hair.
